Giving Back to the Community

In honor of Tahoe City's 150th anniversary and to celebrate 75 years of serving the community, the Tahoe City Public Utility District (TCPUD), in partnership with the North Lake Tahoe Historical Society has developed a unique, self-guided exhibit centered on Tahoe City's rich history. The exhibit is currently on display in downtown Tahoe City until the end of October.

Fifty-two historical banners line the street and each one shares a different story about Tahoe City and the people who formed and influenced the community. The stories stretch from the earliest reference to Tahoe City in 1863 through the 1950's. "We were happy to have developed the concept, coordinated the layout, and installed the banners in celebration of our community's heritage," commented Cindy Gustafson, TCPUD General Manager. "The historical exhibits couldn't have happened without the assistance of Loverde Builders, Truckee Tahoe Lumber Company, the North Lake Tahoe Historical Society, and the many businesses and individuals who were sponsors of TC 150."

The North Lake Tahoe Historical Society provided the historical photographs for the exhibit banners. Executive Director, Marguerite Sprague shared, "The North Lake Tahoe Historical Society is thrilled to collaborate with the TCPUD to bring this self-guided historic tour to reality. We see visitors pausing to take in the historic stories and compare the banners' historic images with the town they see today. The banners are sparking conversations and increased interest in Tahoe City's vibrant heritage."
